Pioneering Voices: Portraits of Transgender People

Beginning January 19, Plymouth is sponsoring and hosting a third exhibit from Family Diversity Projects of Amherst, MA, titled *Pioneering Voices: Portraits of Transgender People.* Plymouth members might remember "Love Makes a Family," from 2005 or "WE HAVE FAITH," from 2014. The photo and text exhibit will be on the art wall and around the Folsom Room for approximately two months.

Pioneering Voices is a museum-quality traveling exhibit including photographs and interviews with people of all ages who are transgender and some of their partners and children. Through first-person accounts and positive images, this exhibit seeks to challenge damaging myths and stereotypes about transgender people and to educate people about this marginalized and often invisible group of people.

This exhibit explores the many aspects of gender identity and variance by sharing these important, ground-breaking stories. *Pioneering Voices* celebrates a range of views, opinions, and experiences that are unique and empowering to transgender people everywhere. At the most basic level, *Pioneering Voices* combats transphobia by breaking silence and making the invisible visible. By encouraging people of all ages to affirm and appreciate diversity, this traveling exhibit contributes to the process of dismantling the destructive power of prejudice and intolerance. As a remarkable tool designed to prevent bullying and increase empathy, *Pioneering Voices* will help make the world a safer place for all people.

Time for Indiana to Approve Hate Crimes Bill

There are many challenges facing the state of Indiana in 2019, but there are also opportunities for us to come together. One goal should be to finally pass hate crimes legislation. This should be a nonpartisan issue, one in which Republicans, Democrats, and independents can come together.

There is little doubt that a hate crimes bill would pass if given the chance to come up for a vote. However, in 2018, previous legislation was killed before either our General Assembly or Senate could vote on it. There is no excuse for this to happen again.

As people of faith, it is especially important that our society offer protections for victims of crimes based on their race, religion, color, sex, gender identity, disability, national origin, ancestry and sexual orientation. We continue to see hate crimes committed against LGBTQ persons, people of color, and religious minorities throughout our state. Acknowledging through law that this is happening shows that we value those who have been victimized. It also provides judges the ability to consider such biases when issuing sentences.

There may be those who will nitpick and try to remove certain groups from this bill, but this only serves to divide us. It's not okay to say, fine, we can have a bill, but we're going to exclude Muslims. Or transgender persons. Or Jews. Or Black Americans. None of us are truly free until all of us are free; we have to stick together for a better Indiana.

Passing hate crimes legislation will not prevent anyone from committing such crimes. What it will do is give greater power for officials to hold people accountable when they act out their hatred for various groups. It is long past time that Indiana catch up with the rest of the nation. After all, who wants to be the last state to pass hate crimes laws? Besides Indiana, there are only four other remaining states. We'd better get moving.

LAST CALL: Completed applications including all supporting documents for Van Gorder, Sinish, or Kent scholarships for tuition and fees for academic credit administered by the Grants and Scholarships Committee are due in the church office by Friday, February 15. Incomplete applications are ineligible for consideration.

The Grants and Scholarships Committee has the pleasant responsibility of awarding scholarship grants for tuition and fees for academic credit from the earnings generated by several endowed funds.

Completed applications with all supporting materials must be received in the church office by the respective due dates. Incomplete applications are ineligible for consideration.

By February 15:

The **Richard Nelson Kent Memorial Fund** provides educational grants for tuition and fees for academic credit for members of the United Church of Christ in the Northeast [Indiana] Association and other qualified applicants who are at least 16 years of age and entering into or continuing ecological studies, conservation biology, or other environmentally related studies.

The **R. Donald and Genevieve M. Sinish Fund** provides awards for tuition and fees for academic credit for 16-to-24-year-old members of Plymouth Church.

The **Van Gorder Scholarship** is awarded annually for tuition and fees for post-secondary education leading to a degree, certificate, or license for a graduating senior who is a member of Plymouth Church.

By April 15:

The **Richard C. Hess Peace Studies Scholarship** will award a \$1,000 tuition and fees scholarship for a college student majoring in peace studies or a related program.

Emma Feigley Fund "Fishes and Loaves" Micro-Grants

"And he said to them, 'How many loaves have you? Go and see.' When they had found out, they said, 'Five, and two fish.' Then he ordered them to get all the people to sit down in groups on the green grass. So they sat down in groups of hundreds and of fifties. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to his disciples to set before the people; and he divided the two fish among them all. And all ate and were filled; and they took up twelve baskets full of broken pieces and of the fish. Those who had eaten the loaves numbered five thousand men." -- Mark 6:38-44

Perhaps you can't feed 5,000 people with two fish and five loaves of bread, but do you have extreme coupon skills that could stock a food bank on the cheap, or the ability to turn a little fabric into a whole lot of clothing basics, or maybe you're a skilled gardener? The Benevolence Committee is excited to announce a new way for Plymouth members to be the church in our community during 2019! Inspired by Jesus' feeding of the 5,000, the Committee is introducing "Fishes and Loaves" micro-grants.

With the funds made available to the church through the generosity of Emma Feigley, the Benevolence Committee will award ten micro-grants of \$100 each. The purpose of these grants is to use a relatively small amount of resources to generate a disproportionately great benefit to others. The projects funded by the micro-grants should express one of the 3 Great Loves that ground the UCC's view of a just world – love of neighbor, love of children, and love of creation (ucc.org/3greatloves).

These grants will require creativity to achieve a big impact, but the possibilities for putting the money to work are nearly limitless. We cannot wait to see what our fellow Plymouth members come up with!

Friendly Reminders From Property Board

As we start 2019, Property Board reminds all groups and organizations using Plymouth Church facilities about building usage. Please complete a Building Use Form at least 72 hours in advance of the meeting time. Forms are available in the church office. It is important to complete the Building Use Form as it helps us schedule custodial staff. A member of each group or organization must participate in a kitchen training session. Use/misuse of the dish sanitizer continues to be an issue and proper operation of this equipment is essential. In keeping with our "GREEN" policy, groups are to use washable dishes and tableware. Also, use the recycle containers for any recyclable materials. No leftover food of any kind is to remain on the premises after the event. Wash/ sanitize the dishes, clean off the countertops, and sweep the floors in the kitchen after use. All areas are to be left clean and ready for the next use. These small measures keep our kitchen looking great so that it may be used by all groups and organizations.

2018 Tax Reminder

Getting ready to prepare your federal tax return for 2018? Remember: the IRS will allow you to deduct the donations you made to Plymouth only if they were dated and postmarked in 2018.

As long as you itemize your deductions, you can generally claim 100 percent of your church donations as a deduction.



Parking Lot Hang Tags Available Through the Church Office During Office Hours

Due to the increased activity downtown and the limited parking available, all Plymouth members and staff are expected to display a yellow Parking Lot Hang Tag when parking in Plymouth's parking lots for Plymouth activities. This will clearly let the staff know that you are a Plymouth member parking on the Plymouth property.

You will need to provide your name and a phone number at the time of receiving a parking tag. This information will be associated with the tag number you are given and will be kept on file in the church office.

If you still have an old yellow parking hang tag, either write down the number or bring the tag number to the church office, or email it to Laura Rudolph, rudyfw@yahoo.com, along with your name and contact phone number, so this information can be entered into the database.

Please take the opportunity to become familiar with the Plymouth Parking Lot Policy, created by the Property Board and presented to the Executive Council in July 2018.

Plymouth Parking Lot Policy

- 1. All members and staff of Plymouth church who desire a Parking Hang Tag will be issued one.
- 2. The Parking Hang Tag is to be displayed at all times on the rear-view mirror on the inside of the front windshield of the vehicle with the numbers facing out so they can be easily read.
- 3. This Parking Hang Tag is for the express use of parking during Plymouth Church activities or events in Plymouth's parking lot located on the NW corner of Berry St. and Fairfield Ave. and the parking area on the west side of the church.
- 4. Cars without Hang Tags displayed will have a notice placed on it reminding the car owner to have the Hang Tag displayed or risk towing at the owner's expense.
- 5. Cars without Parking Hang Tags will be towed at the direction of the church staff.
- 6. Parking Hang Tags are available through the church office during business hours.
- 7. A master list of Parking Hang Tag numbers and the associated names will be maintained by the church office.
- 8. Should a Parking Hang Tag require replacement for any reason, a donation to Plymouth Church is requested.
- 9. Temporary Parking Hang Tags will be issued to contractors by the church office as needed.
